Member Spotlight

You've seen his name on the transom to the bar. There are pictures in the restaurant that he donated. He tracked down the first minutes of the Club and paid for all the framing on the Centennial Wall in the restaurant. Broadmoor has benefited from his generosity for years. Who is this guy? **Meet David Lurvey**.

David's relationship with Broadmoor began 100 years ago, when his grandfather was on the first Board of Directors. His parents were also members and, as an avid golfer, David joined on his own at the age of 24.

Broadmoor Realty was the entity that bought the original property and when David was president of that company the land was deeded over to Broadmoor Country Club. In his years with the club he served three 3-year terms on the board and was on the social committee. He tells us that in the formative years of the club, of the 150 members at the time almost everyone was on a committee. That involvement decreased over time, except for the Golf Committee. He also worked with Sandy Levinson to re-write the clubhouse rules.

Broadmoor experienced financial difficulties for several years, and David's biggest fear was that the 3rd tee turn would end up as a gas station. He so valued the Jewish heritage of this club that he stepped in to help wherever he could. David donated \$50,000 to redo the bar/restaurant area, now known as the Lurvey Room (member Larry Dorfman did the construction work at cost). He also climbed on the

roof and painted all the rust white!

Ever been to one of our Derby Parties? That theme was started by David and his long-time companion Shelley Bernstein Shane, who

was also a member (they met at Broadmoor). While not strictly a club event, many members were invited. David and Shelley held three Derby Parties, donated all the food and drink, and would have up to 200 people attend! When we began our Centennial celebration



plans, David very much wanted to be part of it, so he had the first minutes of the board and other pictures on the Centennial wall framed and mounted. He also arranged to have the pictures on the Board Presidents' walls re-framed and hung.

Shelley passed in 1998 after a 20-year relationship, leaving a daughter David considers his own. Then in 2007 he bought a place in Costa Rica, planning on travelling back and forth frequently. A combination of the real estate crash, the pandemic, and a troubling surgery has limited his travel plans. But even though the surgery didn't go well and left him with mobility issues and a lot of pain, he still is happy that he "opens his eyes every day!"

But there's a happy side to this. Since the pandemic slowed his commute from Costa Rica, he was able to meet Flora, a sweet woman and mother to three daughters who he married at the club this past October! You will often see Flora and one of her daughters at Broadmoor for dinner and other events.

David's profession was, and still is, real estate investment. He continues to manage several of his properties and doesn't see retirement very soon. He really likes projects (but not so much the details).

When asked about his fondest memory of Broadmoor, he recounts a story told to him by a long-time employee, Walter Johnson. You may remember reading about Walter in one of our Centennial newsletters last year. "Many years ago, my grandfather wanted a steak and asked Walter to bring him one. Then he asked Walter to cut the steak in half and had him sit down. Walter said it was the first time a member had ever asked him to dine." Goosebumps.

As with many of our long-time members, David loves Broadmoor – it's in his DNA. When there is a need, he can always be counted on to help. Thanks, David, for all you have done for Broadmoor!

We are saddened in the unexpected death of Rich Potosnak, who was a member of our Board of Directors for the last several years. Rich served on the Facilities Committee and helped research information for some of our infrastructure issues. Employee Spotlight: Meet Chris Groene

We think you will find Chris' journey to Broadmoor an interesting story! Chris is originally from East Moline, Illinois. His dad was a firefighter and passed when Chris was in the 5th grade from the toxic effects of fighting a hair salon fire. An only child raised by his mother, Chris has long known the value of hard work.

While still in high school in 2003, Chris worked as part of a seasonal grounds crew at the Tournament Players Club at Deere Run in Silvis, Illinois. A long-time golfer, he then went to Michigan State and graduated in April 2006 with a degree in Turf Grass Management and a specialty in golf. Interestingly, Chris originally wanted to be a Forensic Scientist as a crime scene investigator. However, after learning that it took about 10 years to become qualified for that position, after graduation Chris moved to Charlottesville, Virginia to grow-in Spring Creek Golf



Club, a new golf community similar to Holiday Farms. He helped start the course from scratch, which opened in September of 2006 and was named by Golf Digest as the top new golf course that year.

From 2007-2009 Chris was the Assistant Superintendent at Meridian Hills. Having previously met Chris Hague, the Broadmoor Superintendent, Chris Groene knew a retirement would soon be coming and joined BCC in 2010 as Assistant Superintendent. When Hague

retired in 2016, Chris went through the hiring process with Landscapes Management, our management company at the time, and was named course Superintendent. The rest, as we say, is history.

Chris has known his wife, Erin, since they were in grade school at St. Anne in Illinois. They also went to the same high school and were part of the same friends group. But it was not until Chris came back from his first year in college that they began a long-term relationship in 2004. Chris got an internship at Baltimore Country Club in the summer of 2005 and Erin went with him. They were married in 2011 and are now the proud parents of Evelyn, 4, and Colton, 1 ½. Chris' mom now lives 15 minutes from them, so it's great for the grandkids.

When asked about the most challenging part of his job . . . he had a hard time coming up with one thing! It's always a challenge trying to stay ahead of the weather while meeting member expectations. He usually gets here at 5:30am to start the day except on Tournament days, when he arrives at 4:30am. During the off season the crew works on projects, such as tree work, clearing leaves, and continuing to mow. Here's an interesting fact Chris shared. The green speeds at the British Open are 10'2"; standards are 10'5" minimum and our players like 11-12'. During the Epperson, the green speeds were 13'!

When asked what he likes best about Broadmoor, Chris gets a lot of satisfaction when the team knocks it out and members appreciate it and give good feedback, with everyone doing their job. He loves the Donald Ross aspect and describes our course as a "growing, living thing," which we may often forget.

Chris also gets a great deal of satisfaction from creating a good staff. During the season he usually has 18 on staff, 8 of whom are full-time employees, and as the high school and college kids go back to school staff goes down to around 10. He appreciates working with Keith to increase the budget to do the things he needs to do.

What would we be surprised to know? Chris is an avid coin collector! His grandfather got him interested when he passed down his collection to Chris at a very young age. He buys a variety of coins and often gets coins for his birthday. What started as a small collection of wheat pennies, mercury dimes, and Kennedy half dollars has now turned into over 1000 coins. His collection now includes many pre-1800 coins, a full collection of silver quarters, numerous silver dollars and various commemorative coin collections, including all The Masters tournament coins since 2008. He also inherited a one troy ounce gold American Eagle coin when he was very young from his Grandpa. When Chris got it no one knew how valuable it was, but it's always locked away in his safe!

We think you and your crew do an awesome job, and many golfers and their guests say the course has never looked better. Great job, Chris!



The Member Guide we published last year has been updated and <u>can be found on our website</u>. Our goal is to update this yearly.



Unfortunately, due to the extreme weather and Clubhouse conditions, our June Herman Invitation had to be rescheduled to September, and the notice of that date will be coming soon. But we had 10 of our lady golfers come out anyway Saturday morning!

Grounds Report by Chris Groene

July is typically one of the most challenging months to maintain turfgrass in the Midwest and 2023 was no exception.

The month started on the drier side, even approaching stage 2 drought conditions. Temperatures were slightly above average in the mid to upper 80s for most of the month with a few days reaching over 90°. The first significant storm hit Broadmoor on July 7th and 8th causing significant tree debris all over the course and 1.5" of rain, which unfortunately resulted in the cancellation of Round 1 of the Stroke Play Championship.





Just as we were getting the course back into shape, another storm hit July 17th, again leading to a large amount of storm debris and 1" of rain. Most recently, we were impacted by two storms, one on the morning of July 28th followed by another storm overnight heading into the morning of July 29th. These storms again caused significant storm debris and 1.3" of rain between the two events, which resulted in standing water in many fairways.

A large amount of ground crew labor had to be dedicated to storm cleanups this month, which resulted in other maintenance tasks not being completed as often. Our goal is to recover as quickly as possible from any storm to make the course at least playable to walkers. Then we focus our attention on debris cleanup and try to get back on track with our typical maintenance practices as soon as possible. Overall, green speeds were slightly slower this month, especially when compared to June, but still averaged 10.5 – 11.5 feet when measured with a Stimpmeter. This is primarily due to labor being shifted into storm cleanup, rain events slowing greens down, heat and humidity causing bentgrass growth to surge and a "stickier" putting surface, as well as a conscious effort not to "push" green speeds too hard during the stressful times which will result in turf loss on our putting surfaces.

With all that said, Broadmoor greens were typically as fast or faster on a daily basis than what professional golfers played during The Open Championship, with a green speed posting of 10'2" and even slower after the rains they received. Please continue to do your part in helping to maintain our Donald Ross gem by properly repairing all ballmarks and replacing your divots. Your efforts have not gone unnoticed this year, please keep up the good work!

(Chris forgot to mention that one of the storms resulted in water pouring into the maintenance barn and his office, causing electrical problems. The result? The roof was repaired!).

Racquet Sports

Our **junior tennis program** ended July 27 and we hope to see more Broadmoor kids next year. The Thursday morning Ladies' Tennis Clinic, 10-11:30, will continue through the fall as long as weather permits. The Broadmoor Adult Pickleball League runs through September 7.




The pool remains open through Labor Day Weekend, and our final day is always "**Bring your Dog**" to the pool day. More as we get closer!

While the golf course is our most valuable asset, the pool is important for us to be able to continue to


