History Lesson of the Month: what is the origin of our name, Broadmoor?

We asked several of our resident historians if they knew. While no one had the definitive answer, there were a number of theories.

Norm Newman said: "As I recall, there's nothing in the original minute book that discusses the name. The founders just called it Broadmoor from the beginning. I believe that the famous Broadmoor resort in Colorado is older than our BCC. I also know that there's an infamous mental hospital for the criminally insane in England that's called Broadmoor.

He's right on both counts!

Sandy Levinson suggested that if the Broadmoor in Colorado Springs was built before our Broadmoor (it was designed in 1918) and if it is a Donald Ross course (it is), it could mean that Donal Ross helped the founders of Broadmoor in Indianapolis with the name. Sounds reasonable to me!

David Lurvey offered this: Several of the early clubs were named after land characteristics. Highland, Meridian Hills, Woodlawn and Hill Crest come to mind. Just a thought. **It's a great thought!**

So we went to the source of all knowledge (Google) and found this:

The term **Broadmoor** refers to a place name that has been in use since the 1860s. It originally appeared as a proper noun and was associated with a specific location. While the exact etymology is not entirely clear, it likely combines the words "broad" and "moor." Here's a breakdown:

- Broad: This word suggests something wide or spacious.
- Moor: A moor is an open, often marshy or heath-covered area of land.

Therefore, **Broadmoor** likely describes a wide expanse of moorland or open terrain. Over time, the name has been associated with various places, institutions, and neighborhoods. In summary, **Broadmoor** typically conveys the idea of a broad or expansive moorland area. Its usage can vary depending on context and location.

So there you have it!



Operations Updates

As we have shared in the past, our current lease with Broadmoor Investments (BMI) requires BCC to pay all insurance, taxes, maintenance, repairs and capital improvements. Information about necessary repairs – past, current, and future – have been reported but we wanted to remind our members of the expenses of operating our club.

During 2023 large items included:

- A/C condenser replacement: \$102,127
- Temporary cooling units: \$70,000
- Boiler replacement: \$31,893
- Golf Maintenance Shop repairs: \$28,940
- Course restroom repairs: \$4,680
- Walk-in cooler repair: \$7,080
- Retention pond pump replacements
 (2): \$21,990
- Pool pump replacement: \$18,638
- Course irrigation line repair: \$6,970

For 2024, we have budgeted repair of the 2ft pool, a new snack bar handler, replacing the fire alarm system, repairing the tennis deck, and other necessary and critical repairs. None of these items are too exciting – and most you cannot see – but they impact our day-to-day operations.

But it doesn't stop there! All of you who own homes know that stuff happens and expenses can pop up just when you think you are on track. Already in 2024 we had frozen pipes to repair, our walk-in-cooler floor had water damage, we have to update the AES meter box for our irrigation box What's next?

Don't despair! LuAnn Humphrey, Keith Clark, Dave Jongleux, Larry Mitzman, Terry Greene, and other members of



our Finance Committee and board have been working overtime to identify priorities, obtain estimates, and create a 2024 budget that addresses the repairs we have identified as well as provides for some reserves. We're not spending money we don't have and are being quite diligent where every dollar goes.

Why are we sharing all this with you? First, our members have asked for transparency, and we have been working hard to comply. Second, we want to make sure you know where your monthly Capital Fund dollars go.

Grounds Report by Chris Groene

Great news...as of February 28 our greens are now re-opened for the season!

Other than a potential snowfall event in March (this is Indiana!) that might temporarily shut the course down, greens are now open. As we start up the 2024 season, please be mindful to correctly repair all ball marks. This is especially important when the turf is growing slower and takes much longer to recover.

Don't be afraid to correct your playing partners if they are improperly repairing them or even worse, not at all! Ballmarks can take weeks to recover if not properly repaired immediately and negatively impact playing conditions for the entire membership. Check out this short article and video on ball marks from the U.S.G.A: Repairing Ball Marks: 5 Things Every Golfer Should Know

"Repairing ball marks is one of the easiest ways that golfers can help superintendents deliver high-quality playing conditions. After hitting a great shot onto the putting green, fixing your ball mark and a couple nearby is an excellent way to celebrate." U.S.G.A. Green Section Staff Green speeds will



typically be slower as we start the season and begin to ramp up our maintenance practices. We will gradually lower our mowing height throughout March and April to a height of just under one-tenth of an inch. Rolling practices will begin to be incorporated more frequently as staffing levels and weather allow. My goal is to achieve our desired minimum green speed of 10.5 feet by mid-April.

Be sure to mark April 1 on your calendar as the course will be closed that day for greens deep-tine aerification. I am looking forward to another great season at Broadmoor in 2024 and hope to see many of you at the Season Kickoff Dinner on March 14!

We will soon reach out to those who played to obtain feedback for future plans. If you weren't there, you missed it!






