
A Message from Our President

Member Spotlight: Gunnar Gotschalk

When we reached out and asked who our members would like to see profiled, the first name that came back was **Gunnar Gottschalk**. As you read his story, you will know why!

Gunnar is originally from New Haven,
Connecticut, and growing up he and his
family would often take trips to Vermont to
ski. From the age of 12, he knew he needed
to decide about a sport, so at 14 he went to
an alternative high school in Vermont to
focus on alpine ski racing. Mount Snow
Academy provided one-on-one tutoring
and high-performance training, as Gunnar's
goal was originally to race on the World
Cup Circuit and, maybe one day, the
Olympics!



Gunnar took a couple of years off between high school and college to pursue his dream and skied 200 days a year in New Zealand, Chile, South America (their winters are during our summers), Austria, Switzerland and the U. S. Circuit. He also knew that ski racing was considered a NCAA Division 1 sport, and he got a full ride to Sierra Nevada College, now known as the University of Nevada, Reno. The competition was pretty

stiff. Europe doesn't have any major intercollegiate sports organizations, so the skiers come here, and at one point Gunnar decided that maybe the Olympics wasn't the right career path. Fortunately, he had a second choice.



Once he stopped racing in 2011 he got hooked on helicopter skiing and goes out at 2x per year in Nevada and Alaska.

Gunnar majored in biology and was premed in college. He started to apply to medical schools but discovered that he needed research experience, so he decided to become a paramedic (EMS), working at a fire station. But with a tough economy in 2010 and 2011, the city no longer had the funds to hire him. In the meantime, he met an internal medicine doctor and, knowing Gunnar needed the research experience, he was hired to work on a drug trial. That experience changed the course of Gunnar's career.

With this move, Gunnar gained incredible knowledge and found he loved the research piece. After 4 years, he knew he needed to go to graduate school and

enrolled in Rush University in Chicago, where he met his future wife, Aileen (more on that later). Gunnar spent much of his time in a neuroscience research lab, focusing on Parkinson's, Alzheimer's, ALS, MS, and other devastating neurological diseases, and spent 6 years working on his PhD. He also published multiple papers. Then he graduated. Then COVID came. And he knew he could contribute.

In February of 2020, Gunnar returned to Nevada (Incline Village at Lake Tahoe) and worked with a group that was conducting early COVID testing. They tested 10,000 people over 4 months and found a way to get around the fact that the "plastic" part of swabs were made in China and not getting to the US. A colleague then encouraged Gunnar to partner in a start-up, and their first project ended in a patent for an intra-nasal peptide therapeutic that blocks SARS-COVID entry. This group is still going, and he has now moved into other medical drug development projects, focusing on lethal and neurological diseases, e.g. triple-negative breast cancer.

The lab for all this work is located at the University of Wisconsin Milwaukee, but the drive back and forth was way too exhausting. And while he was there, Aileen



was here (they married in 2022).

Aileen Hoffman finished medical school and was matched for a residency at IU, Indianapolis. She is now the Chief Resident of diagnostic radiology, considering a fellowship that would be followed by attending, and her focus is on breast cancer. So when Gunnar shared with member Colin Terry that he was doing a startup and faced with all that driving, Colin found space for him on the IU campus.

Gunnar was a golfer and had been looking at clubs. Now that he was in Indy, in 2021 he joined Broadmoor "sight unseen" because it was close to downtown. Previously, he played often and traveled to different courses but having the Club so close to him is a benefit. He had never belonged to a club before, but once he finally saw the course he knew he made the right choice. This year he has played 76 scored rounds. Primarily a solo golfer, he does play in the Wednesday Night Men's League and participates with a choose-up group. He and Aileen will work with Jon Hoover over the winter (and we hope to see Aileen at Tuesday Night Ladies' League). They are also both tennis players and have participated in our Friday night open tennis events.

The best thing about Broadmoor? The people – have not met anyone mean or stuffy and it's great to meet people at different levels in their lives. Several members have helped him professionally, as our members are inclined to do! Also, James is the best!

What a history! And we are happy that you joined here!

Employee Spotlight: Eric "Spice" Spicer

We all know that Chris Groene does an absolutely fabulous job in his role as Course Superintendent, but he couldn't do it without his trusty Assistant Superintendent, Eric Spicer.

"Spice," as he is called by many, is originally from Greenfield where he grew up with his parents, two brothers, and one sister. He has played golf since he was 6 years old and grew up on the course at Hawk's Trail. After finishing high school, he went to Hillsboro Community College in Tampa, Florida, for the next 3 years, studying business as well as working on a golf course. Eric's brother then talked him into selling computers, so he moved to Broad Ripple and pursued that role for 5 years.

But Eric's passion has always been golf, so after returning from a golf trip to the Dominican Republic in 1989, he moved back to Greenfield and began working at Hawk's Trail. He stayed at Hawk's Trail as Superintendent for 6 years, then went to Eagle Point in Bloomington as Assistant Superintendent followed by a stint at River Glen in Fishers. So how did he get to Broadmoor?

As a golfer and golf enthusiast, he came here for the GTE Classic, had caddied here, and then came out for the Midwest Regional Turf Foundation tournament and said to himself, "this is my next job." He tracked down Chris Groene, introduced himself, and waited for an opportunity. When Chris posted the Assistant Superintendent job, Eric applied and was hired. He celebrates his 5th anniversary here next March 1st. Eric says that Chris Groene is the best friend and boss that anyone could

have. What we have also discovered is Eric's love of and appreciation for a Donald Ross course.

Eric was hard pressed when asked about hobbies outside of golf - because he spends so much time here. In fact, he now lives within a few minutes of the Club so is here even more! But we discovered he is a world



traveler – in 2013 he backpacked throughout much of Europe, and has been to South Africa, the British Open, and Wimbledon. His ideal vacation? Playing at St. Andrews (that seems to be on many bucket lists!).

Finally, we discovered that he is a tennis player, although not for some time. Even so, we expect to see him at some of our Open Tennis evenings next summer!



Grounds Report by Chris Groene

October was another busy month on the golf course. We hosted several tournaments and events through the first half of the month. These activities were followed by the successful deep-tine aerification of **4 acres** of greens on the 17th and over **44 acres** of solid tine aerification of tees, fairways, and collars on the 21st and 22nd. With the overall warmer than average temperature this year and smooth aerification processes, we saw significant recovery and very playable conditions within the first week. We have already seen the benefits of this aerification as the majority of "localized dry spots" and weaker turf areas have started to recover.

Now our focus will shift to daily leaf cleanup throughout the fall. Leaves are blown off greens, tees, and fairways every day and then mulched into the bluegrass surrounds. Our bunker complexes like to "catch" a lot of leaves and those are blown out at least twice a week during this time. We will do our best over the next several weeks to keep the course as clean and free from leaves as possible.

Did you know an average mature tree produces 100,000 – 200,000 leaves depending on species? A mature oak tree with a canopy width of 50 feet has an estimated 250,000 leaves!

#7 Tee Sink Hole Update:

An update was provided at the recent annual member meeting but, for those who were unable to attend, here is a current project update:

When the sink hole on #7 tee first appeared this spring, a committee was formed to investigate the extent of the problem as well as propose drainage improvement ideas to

alleviate flooding and improve the low laying areas in #12 and #17 fairway. The culvert under #7 tee was scoped and found to have a compromised culvert that was causing the



washout under the tee after heavy rain events. Expert golf course drainage consultants were brought in to offer their solutions and bid the project.

Based on the consultant's and committee's recommendations, the board approved a full-scale comprehensive drainage improvement project that currently includes replacing and upgrading our current system of a single run of 24" metal culverts and 100-year-old clay tiles to two runs of 24" HDPE culverts which will significantly reduce flooding with the increased capacity.

The connector line from the ditch in front of #13 tee, which is the main outflow drain for the northern portion of the course (Holes #1,2,8,9, and 18 all end up there) was also found to be not draining effectively and will be replaced and tied into the new 24" lines. In addition, a new 2" micro slit drainage system will be installed throughout the lower portions of #12 and #17 fairways.

Overall, this project addresses several significant issues where we will see the benefit for many years to come:

- 1. #7 tee sink hole issue resolved
- Significant reduction in flooding potential at #4 Green, #5 Tee, #7 Tee, #17 Fairway, and #12 Fairway/Approach

 Improvement to fairway drainage in #12 and #17 low areas which will yield better playing conditions and lessen the amount of cart restrictions after rain events

We are currently in the permitting process with the goal of completing this project over the off-season, causing little to no impact on the start of the 2025 season.

By all accounts, this was a very successful event – 28 signed up and 28 showed up! Seems like we may need to do this again next year!



November 13th, 6:30: The Emperor's Soul by Brandon Sanderson


Time is running out for Shai. Forging, while deducing the motivations of her captors, she needs a perfect plan to escape..."

<u>December 18, 6:30: Catherine House by Elisabeth Thomas.</u>

Catherine House is a school of higher learning like no other. Hidden deep in the woods of rural Pennsylvania, this crucible of reformist liberal arts study with its experimental curriculum, wildly selective admissions policy, and formidable endowment, has produced some of the world's best minds: prize-winning authors, artists, inventors, Supreme Court justices, presidents. For those lucky few selected, tuition, room, and board are free. But acceptance comes with a price.

Students are required to give the House three years—summers included—completely removed from the outside world. Family, friends, television, music, even their clothing must be left behind. In return, the school promises a future of sublime power and prestige, and that its graduates can become anything or anyone they desire.
