



Turf Talk May 2025

When I was much younger my brothers, sisters and I, would all get a laugh or two as my father would have episodes of sneezing attacks brought on by seasonal allergies. I grew up in the sandhills of South Carolina and as you most probably have seen videos of the yellow cloud of pine pollen. Considering what my father went through and as I've aged over the years, I fortunately have not grown susceptible to the pine pollen and subsequent sneezing attack from such. BUT, Dad gets his revenge from the oak pollen that has recently invaded the area and Claritin, Allegra nor Zyrtec are no match nor relief. Maybe some rain will help.

Slowly, I'm building up the summer crew as late last month we started to get temperatures needed for the bermudagrass to start creeping in its lateral growth. At nearly the same time we experimented with dragging the fairway with a steel mat in hopes to break up any organic materials that washed over the fairways and left ripples of compacted, lifeless clippings. The point is to expose the soil and prompt warmer soil temperatures. A few months ago, I mentioned some concern about winter damage from the multiple cold snaps and snow and ice cover for nearly the whole month of January. Fortunately, I have seen very little damage but we didn't get away without some affected areas. The reasons for "winterkill" are many. Obviously, the snow-pack and ice are part of it but there are other reasons like desiccation and high traffic in a compacted or restricted space. Examples would be the area between the greenside bunker and the green on #10. Another area would be the tees on hole number 7. It never fails to amaze me how a golf course is built and the tees on the par-three tees are smaller than the par fours and fives. And what's so crazy is those tees receive the most abuse with all the iron play and divots. Essentially the turf was basically denuded from the high traffic. I know you are all asking yourself, what is the right amount of tee space? Rule of thumb, for every 1000 rounds of golf there should be a minimum of 100 square feet per round for the par 4's and par 5's and 200 square feet for the par 3's, 1st and 10th tee.

We are working on a plan to remedy the current issue of tee space and this will be without any major undertaking. As far as the tees at number seven, I believe some sod work will be necessary. Thank you for allowing me to be your superintendent and remember to repair your ballmarks, throw that broken tee into the rough, and play ready golf. See you on the course!
