Big Soft Ginger Cookies--Ingredients

3/4 cup of butter, softened
1 cup sugar, plus additional for rolling
1 large egg, room temperature
1/4 cup molasses
2-1/4 cups of all-purpose flour
2 teaspoons ground ginger
1 teaspoon of baking soda
3/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
1/4 teaspoon salt

Directions

In a large bowl, cream butter and 1 cup sugar until light and fluffy, 5-7 minutes. Beat in egg and molasses. Combine the flour, ginger, baking soda, cinnamon, cloves and salt; gradually add to the creamed mixture and mix well.
Roll into 1-1/2-in. balls, then roll in additional sugar. Place 2 in. apart on ungreased baking sheets. Bake at 350° until puffy and lightly browned, 10-12 minutes. Remove to wire racks to cool.

Turf Talk in November

Wow November already!

Let's see, what do you want to talk about? Over the last two months I've really hit the tree programs pretty hard and the desires to clean up the tree lines to make them more playable. At least that was my attempt, so I won't bore you with more of the same. So where does that leave us? Irrigation? Bunkers?

Wildlife? The weather? Wait, wildlife?

Yes indeed, wildlife, and I'm not talking about our **favorite golf course canine, Leo.**

I'm talking about two other canine species that have been spotted in our neighborhood.



At first we had early morning experiences with several foxes in different locations on the course. Sure, it's kind of cool seeing a fox or two roaming or scurrying thru the fairways and open spaces but at certain times of the year they begin to burrow and build their dens in preparation of breeding season. Unfortunately, when searching for the most suitable location they have tried to dig in a few of our greens. First it was the green at 17, then 8, then #3. We've repaired as best we could but they can be pretty persistent and of course, very sly. Most recently, it seemed that the foxes got bored with their digging, moved on or disappeared and that is when we began to see the other canine species on the course, the coyote(s), a predator of the fox.

We may be in the mix for a turf war here at Lee's Hill.



All 'kitting' aside, wildlife can and will co-exist within our golf course community and precautions should be taken. Please watch your children and pets. When or if confronted by any wild creature please be careful. "Make yourself appear large and intimidating by standing tall, waving your arms, yelling loudly, and making noise by clapping your hands or banging objects together; do not run away, as this can trigger their predatory instincts and encourage them to approach you further."

And you wanted to talk about the weather, pffhh!, so... May is the rainiest month in Virginia and October is the driest month in Virginia. The rainiest season is Summer when it rains 28% of the time and the driest is Winter with only a 21% chance of a rainy day. Man alive!, we're dry! Tonight's forecast..... darkness!
