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Tim Hogarth, Don DuBois head field for 104th SCGA Amateur Championship

NORTH HOLLYWOOD, June 29, 2005 — Defending champion Tim Hogarth of Northridge and newly crowned California Amateur champion Don DuBois of Newport Beach head a field of 84 golfers who will tee it up in the 106th Southern California Golf Association (SCGA) Amateur Championship July 8-10 at Tijeras Creek Golf Course in Rancho Santa Margarita.

This will be just the fourth time that the SCGA's premiere championship — the nation's second-oldest, continuously contested amateur golf championship — will be played at a public course. Tijeras Creek GC is the home course of SCGA President Bill Cunerty, who is also the golf coach at Saddleback College in nearby Mission Viejo. It's also just the fourth time that the tournament has been held in Orange County; the last one was in 1995 when Charlie Wi won at Santa Ana CC.

The 72-hole stroke play event will include 36 holes on Friday, followed by a cut to the low 42 scorers and ties. That group will play 18 holes each on Saturday and Sunday. Tee times begin at 7:30 a.m. each day. Gallery is welcome at no charge.

The 39-year-old Hogarth is seeking to become just the sixth player in history to successfully defend his title, which he won last year at Hillcrest CC in Los Angeles with a 1-under-par 279. That victory also completed a unique "triple crown," as Hogarth became the first player ever to win the SCGA Amateur, SCGA Mid-Amateur (1999) and California Amateur (1999) championships.

To win again, Hogarth will have to turn back a strong field that starts with DuBois, the 46-year-old former professional who last week became the second-oldest player ever to capture the California Amateur when he defeated 17-year-old Joseph Bramlett of Saratoga, 2 & 1, in the 36-hole championship match at Pebble Beach Golf Links. DuBois finished tied for ninth at Hillcrest last year.

Other veteran players of note scheduled to play are:

• Craig Steinberg, 47, of Oak Park, still chasing that elusive fifth SCGA Amateur title after winning four times in a 10-year-span. Steinberg is one of three players ever to win four SCGA Amateur titles; should he win another, he'd join Paul Hunter as the only five-time winner.

• Scott McGihon, 37, of Bermuda Dunes, the 2000 SCGA Amateur and 2004 Trans-Mississippi Mid-Amateur champion, who was a quarterfinalist at last week's California Amateur. McGihon, a middle school teacher and high school golf coach in the Coachella Valley, was runner-up to Hogarth last year.

• Ed Cuff, 43, of Rancho Santa Fe (he recently moved from Murrieta), the 1998 California Amateur champion and 2002 SCGA Mid-Amateur runner-up (to McGihon).

• John Pate, 45, of Santa Barbara, who won the centennial playing of this event in 1999 at Industry Hills and last week lost a 1-up-quarterfinal match to DuBois at the California Amateur. Pate, the 2000 SCGA Mid-Amateur champion, is the brother of six-time PGA Tour winner Steve Pate.

Several younger players will likely challenge Hogarth, as well, including: • Recent USC graduate Nico Bollini of Yorba Linda, the 2002 SCGA Amateur champion;

• Joshua Warthen of Pismo Beach (and San Diego State), the 2003 Southern California Community College champion;

• Kevin Kim of Jamul, who won this year's California Community College individual championship playing for SCGA President at Bill Cunerty. Earlier in the spring, he won the 2005 Rancho Santa Margarita Amateur, which was played at Tijeras Creek GC;

• Brett Kanda of La Crescenta, this year's CIF-SCGA High School Southern Regional champion;

• Cameron Tringale of Laguna Niguel, who was runner-up to Kanda in the Southern Regional and finished 14th in the state tournament.

Throughout its rich history, the SCGA Amateur has been won by some of the greatest golfers in history, including George Von Elm, Johnny Dawson, Bruce McCormick, Al Geiberger and, in 1994, Tiger Woods, who set single-round (62) and 72-hole (270) scoring records winning at Hacienda GC. Equally impressive are those who tried and failed to win the title, including such professional major winners as Craig Stadler, Corey Pavin, Scott Simpson, Mark O'Meara and Phil Mickelson.

Founded in 1899, the Southern California Golf Association is one of the oldest and largest regional golf associations in the world, with more than 155,000 individuals who belong to more than 1,100 clubs in Southern California and Baja California. Among its many services, the SCGA provides handicap indexes for its members; uses its own state-of-the-art handicap computer system at all clubs in Southern California; provides course ratings and Slope ratings for all clubs in the association; publishes FORE Magazine, an award-winning, four-color bimonthly publication for members; publishes the annual Southern California Directory of Golf; runs one of the most dynamic golf web sites in the world; and conducts 13 championships and dozens of qualifying events for itself and the United States Golf Association.

106th SCGA AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP Tournament History

The SCGA Amateur is one of the nation's oldest continuously contested amateur golf championships. The first SCGA Amateur was held less than one year after the Southern California Golf Association was formed on July 29, 1899. Only the Utah Amateur, begun in 1899, has a longer consecutive string (the U.S. Open and U.S. Amateur both predate the SCGA Amateur, but both USGA events were suspended during war years).

A match play format was used for the first 58 years of the tournament. In 1957, the format was changed to 72 holes of stroke play. In 1973, increasing interest and the number of entries resulted in regional qualifying with a 36-hole finale. The 72-hole stroke play format was reinstituted in 1974. In addition to the championship itself, for many years the tournament also had net competition in flights. However, due to the increasing popularity of this portion of the tournament, a separate SCGA Amateur Net Championship was created in 1993.

The list of SCGA Amateur champions includes many of the legendary names of golf. Charles E. Orr, who won the first title with a 6 & 4 win over SCGA President Peter Maud, was described as a "crack player from the Pasadena Country Club." Another Pasadena resident, Dr. Paul Hunter, won a record five SCGA Amateur titles from 1912 to 1929. In 1925, George Von Elm became the only player ever to win the SCGA Amateur, Northern California GA Amateur and California Amateur in the same year (a year later, he became the first Southern Californian to win the U.S. Amateur). The '40s were a golden age of golf in Southern California, with the likes of Johnny Dawson, Bobby Gardner and Bruce McCormick — all eventual Walker Cuppers — captured SCGA Amateur titles.

Notable winners in the 1950s included Al Geiberger (in 1956 and 1959) and car dealer Fletcher Jones, while future PGA Tour members Barry Jaeckel, John Jacobs, Mark Pfeil, Tony Sills, Jeff Hart, Greg Twiggs, Dave Sheff, David Hobby, Paul Stankowski and Todd Demsey have won in subsequent decades. Among those who have tried to win the SCGA Amateur and failed are Craig Stadler, Scott Simpson, Corey Pavin, Mark O'Meara and Phil Mickelson.

In recent years, Craig Steinberg has won four SCGA Amateur titles (1987, 1991, 1992, 1997), just the third person to accomplish that feat, joining Dawson, who won four times, and Hunter who won five titles.

In 1994, Tiger Woods, the most celebrated golfer of the current generation, won the SCGA Amateur at Hacienda GC, setting a four-round scoring record of 270 helped in large measure by a single-round record 62 in the third round.

2004 SCGA AMATEUR

Tim Hogarth of Northridge was the only player under par at Hillcrest CC as he won the 105th SCGA Amateur Championship by four shots over 2000 champion Scott McGihon. Hogarth shot 71-71-68-69 — 279 at Hillcrest, which was playing to a par 70. Hogarth — the 1999 California Amateur and 1999 SCGA Mid-Amateur champion — became the first player to complete the "triple crown" of major amateur titles. Hogarth also captured the 1996 U.S. Amateur Public Links Championship and played in the 1997 Masters.

MULTIPLE WINNERS

FIVE-TIME CHAMPION

Paul Hunter is the only five-time winner in the history of the SCGA Amateur, all the more remarkable considering the spread of years (1908, 1909, 1921, 1924, and 1926).

■ FOUR-TIME CHAMPIONS

Legendary amateur golfer Johnny Dawson captured four SCGA Amateur titles (1942, 1945, 1946, and 1952), while Craig Steinberg captured four titles in a 10-year span: 1988, 1991, 1992 and 1997).

THREE-TIME CHAMPIONS

Walter Fairbanks captured SCGA Amateur crowns in 1901, 1903 and 1905. George Von Elm won in 1922, 1925 and 1927. Bruce McCormick turned the trick in 1947, 1948 and 1963.

Two-time Champions

Twelve other golfers have won two SCGA Amateur titles, but only Brad Greer (and Steinberg) have done it in the past 30 years. Two-time winners include William Frederickson (1906, 1910), Norman Macbeth (1911, 1913), E.S. Armstrong (1912, 1915), Fay Coleman (1928, 1930), Jack Gaines (1932, 1937), Frank Hixon (1939, 1958), Smiley Quick (1940, 1943), Pat Abbott (1938, 1941), Jim Ferrie (1950, 1951), Ted Richards Jr. (1954, 1961), Alan Geiberger (1956, 1959), and Greer (1984, 1985).

■ WINNERS IN CONSECUTIVE YEARS Dawson, McCormick, Ferrie, Greer, and Steinberg are the only back-to-back winners.

MATCH PLAY

LARGEST MARGINS OF VICTORY

- 1925: George Von Elm defeated Norman Macbeth, 12 & 10, at The The Los Angeles CC. Von Elm also won the California Amateur and U.S. Amateur that year and finished second in the L.A. Open the following January.
- **1909:** Paul Hunter defeated Nat F. Wilshire, 11 & 10, at Annandale GC.
- **1926:** Hunter won a record fifth SCGA Amateur by defeating R.G. Cawsey, 10 & 9; the tournament was held at California CC and Brentwood CC.
- 1942: John Dawson of Lakeside GC defeated Bruce McCormick of Oakmont CC, 10 & 8, at The Los Angeles CC. Dawson and McCormick were two of the greatest players in the history of amateur golf.

- **1996:** Kevin Marsh defeated Pat Duncan on the second extra hole at Santa Maria CC.
- 2002: Nico Bollini defeated defending champion John Merrick and Mike Lavery by eagling the second hole of the first three-way playoff in SCGA Amateur history.

- 52: John Richardson when he won the SCGA Amateur in 1973. He was also one of just 13 people to win both the SCGA and California Amateur Championship, having won the latter in 1961. In 1987, Richardson — then 66 won the U.S. Senior Amateur Championship.

106th SCGA AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP Other Notes of Interest

- Two players George Von Elm in 1925 and Charles Seaver in 1933-34 — held the SCGA Amateur, California Amateur and Northern California GA Amateur titles at the same time (the SCGA Amateur preceded the California Amateur in 1934 to make Seaver's feat possible).
- Three SCGA presidents Everett H. Seaver (1928), Norman Macbeth (1929) and Johnny Dawson (1951) — have also won the SCGA Amateur Championship.
- One father and son combination Everett Seaver (1920) and Charles Seaver (1934) have won the SCGA Amateur championship. OF NOTE: Everett is the grandfather and Charles is the father of baseball Hall of Fame pitcher Tom Seaver.

Three other father-son combinations came close:

- Mac Hunter, son of 1923 champion Willie Hunter, lost to Bruce McCormick 1 up in 1947.
- Kemp Richardson lost a sudden-death playoff in 1966 to John Jacobs, then finished in a tie for second in 1968, five shots behind Barry Jaeckel; Richardson's father, John, won the SCGA Amateur in 1973.
- Joe Simpson of Stardust CC finished one shot back of Tony Sills of Riviera in the 1976 SCGA Amateur at California CC. The following year, his son, Scott — the NCAA champion who would later win the 1987 U.S. Open — finished a shot back of Doug Clarke at La Jolla CC.

- Tim Hogarth is the only player to have won California's three major amateur titles: SCGA Amateur (2004), California Amateur (1999) and SCGA Mid-Amateur (1999).
- SCGA President Bill Cunerty is the golf coach at Saddleback College in Mission Viejo. He is the only coach to have won California Community College state championships in three sports: football, women's golf and men's golf.
