Annual Tree Trimming to Improve Turfgrass Performance

This large tree has received seasonal pruning over many years to minimize negative effects on turfgrass quality and playability.

Trees and turfgrass can cause issues if not continually managed. In the Southeast, summer is a good time to perform pruning of problem trees to allow better air flow and sunlight penetration. Some tree species, like live oaks, can produce a lot of shade – negatively impacting turfgrass health on putting greens, tees, fairways and roughs alike. Trees that obstruct a large amount of sunlight and never drop all their leaves are especially problematic for turfgrass. Extensive winter shade on bermudagrass that does not go dormant usually results in thin or no turfgrass in the spring.

Trees that are injured by hurricanes or tropical storms often have a latent response to the damage, taking two or three years to begin dying. Pines are a good example of this phenomenon and dying pines attract pine bark beetles, a pest that can extensively damage living trees. Identifying

and removing damaged trees early can prevent greater tree loss later. Read the USGA article, “Hurricane Hangover,” for more information on this issue.

Trees like magnolias and ficus trees – e.g., banyan trees or strangler figs – can be especially troublesome on a golf course. They do not respond well to pruning and these trees have characteristics that do not lend themselves to coexisting well with turfgrass. They also require continuing leaf and debris cleanup.

Ideally, tree trimming should also include pruning, removal or grinding of surface roots. Trees like bald cypress (*Taxodium distichum*) produce a preponderance of surface roots – sometimes called “knees” – that can break mower blades, cause cart mishaps, interfere with hitting shots, and potentially injure golfers that strike these roots during a swing.

Lastly, sick or damaged trees and limbs can break and cause damage to the course. If you haven’t done so in a while, conduct a hole-by-hole evaluation of your trees and proactively address problem areas. If you need help with evaluating tree plantings as they relate to turfgrass health, playability, tree quality and aesthetics, a USGA tree evaluation visit is something to consider. Tree pruning or removal will pay dividends down the road, and summer is a good time to conduct this work because it is easy to assess the health of the tree and the turf.

2019 Virginia Tech Turfgrass Research Classic & Field Day

Over \$50,000 Raised at Independence GC

For the third straight year, Virginia Tech teamed up with VGCSA and VTC for the annual Turfgrass Research Classic Golf Tournament and Field Day on May 20th at Independence Golf Club in Richmond.

The day kicked off with the Virginia Tech Field Day and a tour of the research plots on the greens of the nine-hole short course at Independence GC. Dr. David McCall, Research Associate Jordan Booth, CGCS and the Virginia Tech team led over 60 attendees on a tour of the short course, presenting the research conducted over the past year. Having these plots in established central Virginia will prove beneficial to the VT research team, as the climate is warmer than Blacksburg and closer to most of the rest of Virginia.

Following the field day, there was an exciting putting contest sponsored by Syngenta. Over 50 golfers lined the putting green and putted simultaneously to the same hole. The closest one belonged to Mark Vaughan of Goodyear GC, who took home the prize.

The golf tournament was a full field with 120 golfers competing in the 4-man captain's choice. Coming in with the low gross score was the host team comprised of Giff Breed, Dan Taylor, Will Sexton and Randy Fisher. The Low Net score was posted by the VGM/John Deere team- Jeff Whitmire, Jeff McMackin, Jay Wade and Jeff Holliday.

With the help of top industry vendors, net proceeds surpassed \$50,000, bringing the two year total to more than \$160,000 going towards turfgrass research! 

VSGA-VIP Scholarship Foundation Announces Scholarship Award Recipients at 2019 VSGA Day



Twenty-nine high-school seniors and two Ph.D. students in the turfgrass research program at Virginia Tech were among 31

scholars honored as the VSGA-VIP Scholarship Foundation announced its 2019 award recipients at Richmond Country Club as part of its VSGA Day festivities.

The Foundation provides grants and gifts for scholarships, scientific and educational research, and other charitable purposes. This year's grants total \$88,000 and since being launched, the program has distributed nearly \$2.4 million to 1,023 students. Funding for scholarships is generated primarily from the sale of the VSGA VIP Golf Card.

"Being able to positively impact the educational pursuits of more than 1,000 students is extremely gratifying," said Michael Millen, president of the VSGA VIP Scholarship Foundation. "The Foundation has come a long way since 1985 when \$4,000 was awarded to our first three students. Many generous VSGA member clubs have supported this initiative for a long time along with thousands of loyal VIP cardholders from throughout the Commonwealth. We are truly grateful for their support."

Virginia high school students with an interest in golf (ability not important) are eligible to apply. Students are evaluated based on academic achievement, character, community involvement and an essay on the impact of golf on the applicant's life.

"This year's class may be our strongest yet," Millen said. "I think six of our award recipients were ranked #1 in their class and several will be playing golf collegiately next year."

2019 grants include Spencer-Wilkinson awards, which draw from a fund formed by Debbie Spencer and Mary Nell Wilkinson. Since its formation more than 20 years ago, 53 young women have received

Spencer-Wilkinson scholarships. This year's awards went to high school teammates from the Maggie Walker Governor's School – Lisa Qin of Glen Allen and Virginia Adams of Henrico.

Other named scholarships include the 19th C. Dan Keffer Award, which goes to an individual in honor of the former VSGA-VIP Scholarship Foundation Committee Chairman. This year's recipient was Vienna's Aaron Liu. The

Red Speigle Award, named in honor of the late longtime teaching professional from the Peninsula area, was given to Norfolk's Rebecca DiNunzio. The David A. King Award, which the senior amateur golfer established in 2002, went to Leslie Lytle of Alexandria. The Richard Smith Award, given in remembrance of the VSGA's longtime director of championships and supporter of junior golf, went to Jimmy Taylor of Alexandria.

John Brewer (Blacksburg/Virginia Tech) – \$1,500: Received undergraduate and Masters degrees from University of Tennessee - Martin. ... Is doing Ph.D. research on optimizing Topramezone and other herbicide programs for weed control in Bermudagrass and Creeping Bentgrass turf.

Jordan Craft (Newport/Virginia Tech) – \$1,500: Received undergraduate and Masters degrees from Mississippi State University. ... Is doing Ph.D. research examining factors that govern zoysia grass response to herbicides during green-up.







Golf Industry Comes Together for 12th Annual National Golf Day

"The game of golf is growing and evolving, and it is important that we come together collectively in Washington to share stories of impact the game is having on business and communities across the United States," said Greg McLaughlin, CEO of World Golf Foundation, the organization that coordinates WE ARE GOLF activities. "From athletes from every corner of the world competing each week on the PGA TOUR and LPGA, to global companies investing billions of dollars in and around the sport, to healthy participation in traditional and emerging ways, the game of golf is a strong and vibrant part of American culture."

"We are here to educate our elected officials that the golf industry is made up of many small businesses that contribute to our national economy," said Jay Karen, CEO of National Golf Course Owners Association and Chair of the WE ARE GOLF Board. "The importance of fair and good taxation policies is paramount to the success of our businesses."

"Sports have always been an important part of American culture, and in my hometown of Augusta, Georgia, golf is at

On Tuesday, April 30, the third-annual Community Service Project featured more than 200 participants demonstrating the industry's commitment to collaboration on beautifying and preserving historical landmarks between the Lincoln Memorial and Washington Monument. Golf industry leaders, coordinated by Golf

Course Superintendents Association of America, volunteered to lay sod, rake, edge, overseed, aerate, mow, mulch, brush walkways and spruce gravel pathways across 17 projects along the National Mall. The four hours of work saved the U.S. National Park Service nearly four months of labor costs.

Numerous golf courses and industry businesses are celebrating and recognizing National Golf Day in their own communities through activities and special offers. Included is Topgolf, which is offering complimentary group golf instruction lessons at 50 locations across the U.S.

This event is a tribute to Joe Saylor, the honoree of this annual memorial event. Joe was longtime superintendent at James



GCSAA launches final certificates for Assistant Superintendent Series

GCSAA has been working to create greater opportunities and engagement for the career development of Assistants, and that effort has come full circle with the release

of the final two certificates within the Assistant Superintendent Certificate Series (ASCS). The latest certificates to be added to the program include Principles of Golf Course Environmental Stewardship, and Principles of Golf Course Leadership & Communications.

Previously, the program included Principles of Golf Course Agronomy, and Principles of Golf Course Business, which round out the program to include 4 certificates in all. Unlike the first two certificates that launched in 2018, the two

new certificates will be earned by watching a series of webinars, taking short quizzes, and then doing outside activities that demonstrate the proficiency in the competencies covered by the certificates. These will be done through the Learning Hub. Details can be found by logging in to your account at gcsaa.org Education Certifications and exams Assistant Superintendent Certificate Series

Like the other certificates in the ASCS, these are stand-alone certificates. A participant can earn just one or work towards completing all of them, working at their own pace. In speaking with members who have engaged this program, I can say that these certificates are certainly not a cake walk, even for experienced assistants who have a wide breadth of knowledge in these areas. These certificates were designed to be challenging, which makes them more valuable and powerful when leveraging

them in the marketplace.

We offer member and non-member pricing. Member pricing is \$50.00 per certificate, and non-member pricing is at \$75.00 plus the price of the webinars (\$60 per webinar). Remember, access to webinars is free of charge for GCSAA members. In all, it is much more economical to complete these certificates as a member vs being a non-member.

Currently, we are offering an incentive to complete all four certificates in 2019. Koch is offering GCSAA gift certificates to the first 150 participants who complete all four, and this program is set to expire on 12/31/2019.
