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Annual Conference a Hit in Charlottesville

In just its sixth year, the VGCSA Annual Conference has matured into a "can't miss" experience for Virginia's golf course superintendents and associated industry colleagues. Revels and Finch continued to serve as the presenting sponsors.

The Inn at Darden on the UVA campus played host to a crowd of over 100 who came for education, networking, CEU credits, and of course, FUN!

The two-day conference began on the afternoon of December 2nd, at the Darden Conference Center in an ideal setting. After introductions by President Bill Keene, Dr. Paul Giordano of Bayer gave a "Perception vs Reality" presentation, highlighting the ongoing fight put up by environmentalists against the golf industry. What they perceive, versus the truth of science are very different things, and we must be constantly mindful to educate the public on science and the stewardship of golf course superintendents.

The second presentation was the Superintendent Panel presented by GE Turf Consultants. Bill Keene moderated the discussion featuring panelists Scott Kinnan of Farmington, Chris Harriman of Hermitage and Jeff Yarborough of Stonehouse. The group discussed turf issues such as goose grass, labor issues and more, while fielding numerous questions from the audience.

Then it was time to talk "Skin Cancer Prevention," with dermatologist Nicole Harriman. Her presentation showed some dramatic photographs of the effects of the condition, while offering excellent tips superintendents should employ regularly to stay healthy.

The next presentation featured Jenny Zenner in conversation with Damon DeVito to explore what a *growth* versus *fixed* mindset is and what it means for a superintendent's own career and how they manage their team. Zenner is a Career Consultant for the UVA Darden School, while moderator DeVito owns Affinity Management, which operates golf courses in Virginia and Maryland.

Then the VGCSA Annual Meeting,

presented by Landscape Supply, took place. President Keene gave a fun and informative review of the 2019 activities of the association. Awards Chairman David Walter had the pleasure of presenting the annual awards to Jay Wade of Magnolia Green GC (Environmental Stewardship) and Jeff Holliday, CGCS of Salisbury CC (Distinguished Service). Then Neil Jones of Buy Sod announced a Scholarship Award to Madison Mauldin. Keene presented the President's Award for Lifetime Service to Mark Vaughn, CGCS, who drew a standing ovation. Cote then recognized and thanked outgoing board members Aaron Wells and Josh Nunn. And he thanked all the Partners for their tremendous support of the association. After adjournment, the group enjoyed the Syngenta Reception hosted by Larry Feller in the beautiful South Lounge. That evening, Ian Grove of Target Specialty Products hosted a networking party, with Monday Night Football featured.

The second day of the conference opened with a networking breakfast. Then attendees moved into the conference hall for a dynamic lineup of speakers.

Dr. Rob Golembiewski of Bayer was back by popular demand from last year. His provocative title for his presentation was "Let's Smoke Some Weeds." His broad ranging address was both educational and entertaining.

Next up was VGCSA Lobbyist Robb Bohannon with the "Legislative Update." He made note of the Democrats' new "super majority" in Virginia, holding the majority in both the Senate and the House of Delegates, along with the offices of Governor and Lt. Governor. This could be challenging times for superintendents, with anticipated pressure from environmentalists and from a labor sector seeking significant increases in minimum wage.

Then it was time for the USGA's Elliott Dowling, speaking on "Assessing Playability on Your Course." He displayed new tee systems designed to make the game more fun – they are based on how far you hit your driver. He sees a need to focus more on fun, rather than challenge, in order for the game to prosper. Geoponics sponsored the

presentation.

Josh Coates, Tournament Director for the VSGA, was then called upon to speak on "New Rules & Course Markings." A lot changed in 2019, such as putting with the flagstick in, tossing stones out of bunkers for no penalty and the introduction of "penalty areas." There is a new local rule for a lost ball, which clubs can use to speed play. He also discussed how the new rules affect how the course is marked.

After lunch, which was sponsored by Precision Labs, it was time for a new

segment, the "IGNITE Sessions," featuring short presentations by vendors with new products. The speakers were Sandra Burton of PondHawk, Cutler Robinson of GE Turf Consultants, David Hunsucker of The Drone Company RVA, Jeff Briggs of SePro and Jerry Lemons of Better Billy Bunker.

Batting cleanup in the conference was the Virginia Tech Team, represented by Dr. Mike Evans, Dr. Mike Goatley, Dr. David McCall, Dr. Clebson Goncalves, Jordan Booth and new team member Dr. Daniel Sandor. They discussed the direction of the program, with

enhanced student recruiting. McCall and Booth gave updates on the research at Independence Golf Club. Goncalves spoke on his Poa annua research and invited VGCSA members to submit samples. Then Dr. Sandor was introduced to the group – he was in the process of moving from the University of Minnesota to Blacksburg.

President Keene wrapped it up with thanks to all the speakers, then he conducted drawings for prizes donated by Buy Sod and Vereens. The conference was adjourned.

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Holliday Recognized for Distinguished Service

Jeff Holliday, CGCS of Midlothian, VA has been recognized by the VGCSA with its Distinguished Service Award for 2019.

The award is "presented to a member who has

given his time unselfishly in promoting golf course management and unification of the Virginia Golf Course Superintendents." By all accounts, Holliday earned the distinction through his professionalism and integrity, and his interaction with his fellow superintendents, as well as his leadership in numerous state initiatives.

Growing up in York, PA, Holliday did not grow up with golf as a primary sport, like many other superintendents. In fact, when it was time to head off to college, he planned to be a school teacher as he enrolled at NC State. Along the way, he had a friend who was enrolled in the Turfgrass program, who was bragging how great it was to have a job where you were outside most of the time. That got to sounding better and better to Holliday, and one day he asked the Dean about changing his major.

The Dean wanted to make sure he was serious. He told him to work a summer at a golf course, then make the call. So Holliday found summer work at Prestonwood Country Club in nearby Cary, NC, and things went well. He switch his major and got his turf degree in 1992.

But his first job wasn't exactly Augusta National. He found himself back in PA, Littlestown to be specific, helping a guy build a golf course on a pig farm! But he made the most of his time at Quail Valley, learning how to grow in greens, fairways and tees. He was there a year and a half.

Then an opportunity popped up at Hershey Country Club, a really nice club in PA. He was there for a year and longed to go back to the Carolinas. So in 1995, he got an opportunity to go south, but it wasn't the Carolinas, instead it was The Country Club of Virginia, working for Mark Silva. His first job was Assistant on the James River

Course. Then when another guy left, Silva made him Assistant over both the River Course and the Tuckahoe Creek Course. Silva got promoted to Director in 1998, so he passed along the favor to Holliday, making him Superintendent over both the River and Creek. While there, he learned a lot and participated in a bunker renovation.

It was 2000 when Salisbury Country Club recruited him as Superintendent - a "marriage" that will hit 20 years in February. In 2003, he worked with Lester

George on the construction of a new nine. In 2006 they did a re-grassing program on the original front nine. Another big project was the installation of a new irrigation system on the original 18 in 2015, coupled with a bunker renovation to the Better Billy Bunker system.

Throughout his career, Holliday has become known for "giving back" to his fellow superintendents through his involvement in industry organizations. He actually started before VGCSA even

existed. Silva encouraged him to get involved with the Old Dominion GCSA, and he went through the chairs to become President.

His next work was with the Virginia Turfgrass Council, where he served on the Education Committee and chaired the Research Tournament. He was there four years and he won their President's Award.

In 2010, he joined the VGCSA Board as Secretary/Treasurer. He was very active with the BMP project, the Environmental Cup (research fundraiser) and in government relations, with multiple trips to the state legislature speaking on behalf of the golf industry. At the Virginia Agribusiness Council banquets, he met multiple Governors.

He rose to President, serving an extended term of 2014-2016. He first captained the Virlina Cup team in 2014 and was involved for the next few years,

including wins at Belle Haven and Princess Anne. He helped spearhead the Mid-Atlantic Golf Council, along with a major regional conference in 2018, attracting national golf leaders to speak. He also served on GCSAA national committees and was VGCSA's voting delegate.

A top goal of his is to raise the image of the profession. He would like to see better compensation and benefits for all Turfgrass professionals. He also focuses on

the perception of the superintendent from an environmental perspective – he knows what stewards they are, but they still fight false perceptions.

"This award means a lot to me," Holliday remarked. "It lets me know my volunteer efforts are appreciated and my service is not unnoticed. I hope it encourages others to serve!"

Holliday's hobbies are hunting and fishing, but what he loves best is time with his family, wife Brenda, son Bryce and stepson Brad. Plus he is a diehard Wolfpack fan.

Vaughn Wins President's Award

Mark Vaughn of Danville, VA and Goodyear Golf Club has been recognized by the VGCSA with the 2019 President's Award.

The award is "in recognition of a career of distinguished and

meritorious service and commitment to advancing the profession of golf course superintendent in the Commonwealth of Virginia, and in the grateful appreciation for over twenty years of contributions that led to the advancement of association affairs since its inception." The award was presented by VGCSA President Bill Keene during the Annual Meeting in Charlottesville.

Vaughn grew up in Madison, NC and enjoyed playing high school golf. He went to NC State University with plans to become a CPA, until one day he bumped into an old high school golf rival, who made a comment that changed his life – his friend told him that he was a student in the Turfgrass department, something Vaughn was unaware of – and after his freshman year, he changed his major. He was in the same class as Steve Vessels, longtime superintendent at Boonsboro Country Club.

Following graduation, Vaughn got his start with Gary Stafford at The Cardinal Golf Club in Greensboro, NC. He then took a brief assistant's job with Oak Hollow GC in High Point, before moving over to Meadow Greens CC in Eden, NC. Then in 1980 he had the opportunity to go to the new Goodyear GC in Danville, which was under construction – the first nine holes opened later that year. He has been there ever since! In 1984, he was made GM in addition to his superintendent duties, certainly a pioneer in that regard.

He loved Goodyear GC, which was corporate golf and golf only – and he was quickly immersed in all facets of the golf operation, including the pro shop and finance matters. Because of that, he often employed multiple perspectives in decision-making, balancing course conditioning

concerns with revenue decisions. Only recently has he acquired other duties, such as taking care of ball fields, playgrounds and a shooting range.

Vaughn's association involvement began with the Piedmont Turfgrass Association (NC), and he served as President in 1986. He has been a member of the Virginia Turfgrass Association (VTA) for over 35 years, with service on its Board, as well as the VGCSA since its inception in 1999. Vaughn has also served the Virginia Turfgrass Council on the Board and a number of committees, including a stint as Treasurer and chairman of the Research

Golf Tournament. Currently he is the editor of the VTC Journal. A proficient player, Vaughn was a member of the VGCSA Virlina Cup Team in 2011.

Vaughn's involvement in the profession grew out of his love of the game as a player, and he always enjoyed being outdoors. Once in the business, he always reveled in what was accomplished after a long, hard day of work. It was always a good fit for him.

"The people in this business are second to none," Vaughn proclaimed, when asked about what he likes most about the profession. "I also enjoyed construction and the opportunity to play some

really great courses." Vaughn also enjoyed working major championships, including US Opens at Pinehurst #2.

Vaughn was asked about advice for the young people entering the profession. "They need to get involved!" he counsels. Early on, Virginia Tech professor Dave Chalmers got him involved writing articles on turf in south central Virginia. He did not want to do it at first, but he now looks back and sees how that led him to involvement locally, regionally then nationally. "I got a lot out of that. You always get more back than what you put it

in," he added. He recommends networking to the new generation of golf course managers, but not just by Instagram or Twitter. "There is no replacement for spending a few hours with your peers at a local, state, or national meeting; OR just playing 18 holes."

In closing, Vaughn suggests, "you must find a balance between work and the rest of your life. It goes by fast!" He does think the younger generation is a little better at this than his own. "In the old days, a lot of us probably spent too many hours at the course, but that's just how our generation is wired."

Wade Recognized for Environmental Stewardship

Jay Wade of Williamsburg, VA has been recognized by the VGCSA as winner of the 2019 VGCSA Environmental Stewardship Award.

The award is presented "in recognition of

distinguished and meritorious service in the environmental stewardship of Virginia golf courses, and in grateful appreciation for unselfishly promoting the profession of golf course management, which led to the advancement of the association." Wade is the Golf Course Superintendent at Magnolia Green Golf Club in Moseley, VA.

Wade grew up in Springfield, VA and got into golf late at age 20, when he moved to Richmond to work for Steve Snare, CGCS at The Crossings GC, the top public course in the area at the time. He really loved it and entered J. Sergeant Reynolds pursuing a turf degree, while still working his job. He earned a degree in Horticulture, with a specialization in Turf Management.

His next move was to a new course in Southside, Birkdale Golf Club, working under Ken Anderson as Assistant. After a year, he got an opportunity at another new course, Mattaponi Springs, as Assistant in 2005. During his tenure there, he worked for Andy Lutz, Jeff McMackin and Sean Owens. In 2008, he joined the Billy Casper Golf team to become Superintendent at Ocean View GC in Norfolk. He moved to Williamsburg, as his wife was a school teacher there.

In 2011, Billy Casper Golf was hired to manage Magnolia Green in the Richmond outskirts, and Jay took the opportunity to become Superintendent and oversee a major project there. The Magnolia Green project actually began years prior as a Nicklaus design; however, only 10 holes were completed before the bad economy hit. Wade's opportunity was to complete the course, which including converting all tees, approaches and bailouts from bentgrass to bermudagrass. This conversion saved water, chemicals, and fertilizer.

The pristine, wooded and hilly land was teeming with wildlife, and in 2012 Wade sought to get certified by the Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary program, a very challenging goal indeed. You had to qualify in six different sections: (1) Environmental Planning, (2) Wildlife Habitat Management, (3) Chemical Use Reduction & Safety, (4) Water Conservation, (5) Water Quality Management and (6) Outreach & Education. He was embarking on this project even before his maintenance facility was completed, making it even more difficult, but he persisted and earned the distinction.

Some of the measures he implemented included developing a written environmental plan, protecting native wildlife areas, shoring up creek banks, and water testing. He promoted the certification in a blog, on Facebook and in member correspondence.

The VGCSA's Best Management Practices manual was published around the same time, and he integrated BMP's into his daily management practices. He established water source filters, limited fertilizer and pesticide use and sought to protect pollinators. He also adopted a "firm and fast" philosophy for play, which saved water.

More recently, he contributed to the effort to get all Virginia courses to have a written Nutrient Management Plan, which was accomplished with a 99% participation rate in 2017. Not only is this a good

practice, Wade noted its PR value as well, remarking "it raises the image of our profession as environmental stewards."

More recently, Wade has embarked in a beehive project, starting this past May, expecting to harvest honey next year. In addition to the hives, he supports pollinators with new plantings of wildflowers and milkweed to attract pollinators, such as Monarch butterflies.

There are tons of wildlife on his course, including all types of birds, deer, turkey, bald eagles, Bufflehead ducks, black bear, coyote, and fox. The bird list also includes bluebirds, purple martins, osprey, heron, loons, egret, Red Tail hawk, hummingbird, mallard, jay, robin, sparrow.

"This award is a great honor," said Wade. "I'm passionate about environmental stewardship, as are my industry colleagues."

Wade is a family man, enjoying his time with wife Kelly and sons Josh (12) and Zachary (9), who are into all sorts of sports activities. The family enjoys living in Williamsburg, where his wife works. His commute is 65 miles each way, but family comes first – he uses time on Route 5 to prep for the day on the way in and to decompress on the way back.

Old Dominion Awards Two Scholarships

The Old Dominion GCSA has announced the winners of two \$1,000 scholarships. The program was established in 2016 as a means to support the employees of golf courses that are actively enrolled in an institution of

higher learning. Any employee at a golf course with a current VGCSA member in good standing.

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Virginia Relinquishes the Virlina Cup

The Dormie Club in Pinehurst Plays Host



Just a year after wielding their best golf in the history of the matched, the VGCSA Team succumbed to a spirited Carolinas Team, out for revenge. The result was a decisive opening day rout, making a close match the second day essentially meaningless. When the dust cleared, the Carolinas held the Virlina Cup for the sixth time in ten matches.

The first four ball match featured a

matchup of two Virginia Assistant Champs, Garrison Fowler and Terry English, who now represents the Carolinas. English and his partner Downs staked an early lead by winning the first match over longtime teammates Fowler and Brent Graham. Then the second match went to the Carolinas, before Boyce and Yancey stopped the slide by halving the third match. In losing the fourth match, clearly the Virginians had their backs against the wall early, 3.5 to 0.5.

Again in Foursomes, the Carolinas GCSA won the first two matches, ballooning the lead to 5.5-0.5. Then Jeff Whitmire and Jeff Snyder got a halve, but the day ended with another foursomes loss

Celebrating the Virginia Tech Turfgrass Research Classic & Field Day Over \$50,000 Raised at Independence GC

For the third straight year, Virginia Tech teamed up with VGCSA and VTC for the annual Turfgrass Research Classic Golf Tournament and Field Day on May 20th at Independence Golf Club in Richmond. It was an amazing event, which raised over \$50,000 for turf research.

The day kicked off with the Virginia Tech Field Day and a tour of the research plots on the greens of the nine-hole short course at Independence GC. Dr. David McCall, Research Associate Jordan Booth, CGCS and the Virginia Tech team led over 60 attendees on a tour of the short course, presenting the research conducted over the past year. Having these plots in established central Virginia will prove beneficial to the VT research team, as the climate is warmer than Blacksburg and closer to most of the rest of Virginia.

Following the field day, there was an exciting putting contest sponsored by Syngenta. Over 50 golfers lined the putting green and putted simultaneously to the

same hole. The closest one belonged to Mark Vaughan of Goodyear GC, who took home the prize.

The golf tournament was a full field with 120 golfers competing in the 4-man captain's choice. Coming in with the low gross score was the host team comprised of Giff Breed, Dan Taylor, Will Sexton and Randy Fisher. The Low Net score was posted by the VGM/John Deere team-Jeff Whitmire, Jeff McMackin, Jay Wade and Jeff Holliday.

With the help of top industry vendors, net proceeds were \$53,840, bringing the three year total to \$169,242 going towards turfgrass research! Landscape Supply and Harrell's renewed the top sponsor level, Hokie Patron - \$5,000, with Virginia Green and BASF at the Dr. John Shoulders Patron - \$4,000. There were

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Government Relations Round-UP

VGCSA Lobby Day Comes Early – Set for January 16th

DEMOCRATS WIN CONTROL OF THE HOUSE AND SENATE

On the strength of an incredibly robust turnout for an off-off year election,
Democrats have won control of both the House and the
Senate. The road to the Democratic majority rolled directly through the urban crescent.

Republicans lost eight seats (two in the Senate and six in the House) in November. No House or Senate Democrat incumbent was defeated for reelection in 2019. For the first time since 1993. Democrats will control both chambers of the General Assembly as well as the Governor's office. The Senate will move to a 21-19 Democratic majority (which is the exact same margin the Republicans previously had when they controlled the chamber). Republican incumbent Senator Glen Sturtevant (R-Richmond City) and the Northern Virginia seat formally held by Senator Dick Black (R-Loudoun) moved to the Democratic column, giving them

control of the chamber.

In the House of Delegates, Democrats now hold a commanding 55-seat majority, which ends two decades of GOP control over the chamber. Some of the prominent members of the House Republican caucus that were defeated for reelection include House Appropriations Committee Chairman Chris Jones (R-Suffolk), House Republican Caucus Chairman Tim Hugo (R-Fairfax), and House Transportation Committee Chairman David Yancey (R-Newport News).

The legislative session begins January 8th; however, pre-filing of bills is ongoing. Already there have been a number of bills addressing minimum wage, which will almost certainly be heading upward. Several bills have been filed that would phase in an increase to \$15/hour over the next three to five years. VGCSA lobbyist Robb Bohannon is also expecting some pressure from environmentalists to push back against chemical use which is currently EPA-approved.

With changes in party control come changes in committee leadership. In December, Speaker of the House-Elect

Eileen Filler-Corn (D-Fairfax) named long-serving Delegate Ken Plum (D-Fairfax) chair of the House Agriculture, Chesapeake and Natural Resources Committee, and newly chosen Senate Majority Leader Dick Saslaw (D-Fairfax) named Senator Chap Petersen (D-Fairfax City) chair of the Senate Agriculture, Conservation and Natural Resources Committee. Full committee membership for 2020 will not be known until the beginning of the legislative session.

In an effort to promote the golf industry, VGCSA is planning its annual Lobby Day for Thursday, January 16th. VGCSA Board members, along with Government Relations Committee and other interested parties plan to visit the offices of all 100 delegates and all 40 senators with a message of environmental stewardship, along with the importance of golf as a group of small businesses which employ 30,000 Virginians in an industry with a \$2.5 billion economic impact.
