We've made it through the summer and fall is officially here! I hope everyone has enjoyed some good times on the course this season.

With our resurfaced TifEagle greens now 15 months old, I wanted to use this month's article to address some concerns I've heard going around the club recently. I'm aware some members are not satisfied with our current grow-in progress, and expected the grass to have matured more by now. Hopefully I can shed some light on the challenges we've faced, and why I'm confident we're headed in the right direction.

Going back to the beginning, we sprigged our greens last June. The installer was stretched thin on staff, and we ended up getting reimbursed for a portion of the project because they couldn't deliver the install help they promised. We had to scramble to get the sprigs laid while they were still viable.



The first two weeks after sprigging involves watering each hour to get the roots to shoot from the sprigs and attach to the soil. Then it's time to begin applying granular fertilizer, which has to be watered in thoroughly or it will actually cause root damage instead of promoting root growth. On day fifteen, right before we began to fertilize, our pump house took a lightning strike that knocked out the VFD that controls the pumps. Due to supply chain issues, a replacement VFD would not be available for six months. That meant the only way to water the greens was manually, and we were advised to limit the number of times we manually switched the pumps on and off in order to avoid further damage to the system.

So we had a decision to make; granular feed the greens, which would require manually turning on/off the pumps multiple times per day in rapid succession, or liquid feed them to avoid damaging our pump station any further. Understandably, we chose to liquid feed using our spray rig (and later a borrowed spray rig from Rivermont CC after ours blew an engine from overuse). But liquid feeding only puts out about ½ lb of nitrogen per week, vs. 2 lbs for granular feed, and we applied about 9 lbs. less nitrogen than planned over the next six weeks before reopening. This caused us to reopen with thinner coverage than desired, and to carry that thinner coverage into the dormant winter months.

A warm spring would have enabled us to make up some ground after the challenges I've described. But instead it was a wet and cold Masters in April, and a wet and cold spring for Berkeley Hills. Thankfully we got a brief break with some warmer weather the ten days post-aerification at the beginning of May which helped us heal from that procedure. But then more cool weather and heavy rainfall slowed down greens growth again.

Once temperatures finally warmed up towards the end of June, we were then faced with another decision. Fertilizing heavily and leaving cutting heights high would have accelerated the fill-in of thin areas on the greens, but the membership would have experienced a summer of slow, fuzzy, unpleasant playing conditions. Instead we took the steps necessary to provide the best putting conditions possible for our members over the summer tournament season, understanding that it would take longer for the grass to fill in completely and show that lush emerald carpet look everyone is expecting to see.

Our grass has been tested by the UGA and ABAC experiment station and confirmed to be healthy TifEagle Bermuda. We recently had a USGA agronomist conduct a site visit to review our grow-in and he confirmed we're headed in the right direction, and are where we should expect to be after the unique challenges we've faced during this greens resurfacing process.

I'm looking forward to seeing the greens continue to grow and mature over these remaining weeks of fall, and optimistic for a great second year with a little help from mother nature next spring. And in closing I'd like to point out that the comments I hear comparing us to Atlanta Athletic Club, TPC Sugarloaf, Reynold's Plantation, etc. aren't an apples to apples comparison, as those facilities dwarf us in initiation fees, dues prices, chemical, fertilizer and equipment budgets, staff sizes, etc. I'm grateful to have the budget the club provides me to take care of the course. But in my opinion we punch above our weight class relative to the clubs we are often compared to.

USGA COURSE CONSULTING SERVICE

Expert evaluation to help improve golf course playing quality, environmental sustainability and economic efficiency

As mentioned in Superintendent Chris Purvis' article, Berkeley Hills recently welcomed USGA Agronomist Chris Neff, GCSAA, to visit the club and evaluate the status of our TifEagle greens following their first year of establishment. Mr. Neff's full report is currently being compiled, however we'd like to share some notable points from the consultation below.

- ◆ The greens are healthy TifEagle and still in the process of filling in completely. This is the reason for the brown tips visible on the ends of some of the grass stems, and the "splotchy" appearance of the grass where the turf is still growing in multiple directions versus having an established grain growing in one direction.
- The conditions experienced during the sprigging process last June, the inability to apply granular fertilizer during the initial grow-in due to lightning damage at the pump station, and the weather conditions in northern Georgia over the winter, spring and early summer have all contributed to slowing the maturing process of the turf.
- There is a compaction layer that exists in the subsoil roughly 6-8 inches below the surface in the greens cavities that is prohibiting proper water percolation and nutrient and gas exchange in many areas. As this compaction layer was not addressed during the greens resurfacing due to the prohibitive cost, beginning a process of annual "drill and fill" deep-drill aerification next May is a necessary procedure to ensure long-term turf health, eliminate chronic wet areas on greens, and soften the greens to be more accepting of well-struck iron shots. This procedure has already been budgeted and approved by the Board of Governors.
- The club's agronomy practices for the fall should focus on promoting as much growth as possible prior to the turf going dormant this winter, and the grass should continue to be treated with a combination of fertilizer and growth regulator during the winter months so in the spring conditions will be ripe for accelerated but controlled growth as soon as temperatures permit.

Tree maintenance crews began working throughout the property at the end of September completing an aggressive tree removal and tree trimming project co-financed by BHCC capital funds and a generous member contribution. At the time of this writing workers have almost finished with the project, and course maintenance staff are preparing the affected areas for new sod installation.

Singer / Songwriter / Conservationist John Denver was known as a long-time spokesman for the National Arbor Day Foundation, encouraging the planting of trees throughout his career. However, we think even John would appreciate the improvements this recent project have made in enhancing the playability and beauty of the course for golfers to enjoy, while also promoting greater turf health via addressing shade and air circulation problems in affected areas.

The answer is no, and especially not through damp areas that leave wheel ruts for other players to play through. Please demonstrate care for the course and manage your actions accordingly.

Finally, some housekeeping notes. All members and their guests should continue to check in the Golf Shop before playing. And men, please tuck your shirts in and have hats facing forward. We're not trying to put on airs at Berkeley, but we still want to look our best when we're here.

In closing I would again like to express my sincere gratitude for the kindness and support my staff and I have received from the membership through this transition period. It's an honor to be your pro.



PREPAID DUES REMINDER

With the start of the club's new fiscal year, Berkeley Hills offers members the opportunity to prepay their dues for the next twelve months. As an incentive for prepaying, the Board of Governors has approved the following dispensations...

Full Golf Classification – Members prepaying their dues for October 2023 thru September 2024 will receive five golf guest passes (cart included) that may be redeemed on weekdays and weekends without restriction. This represents a \$593 value for prepaid dues payers.

Senior and Junior Golf Classifications – Members prepaying their dues for October 2023 thru September 2024 will receive three golf gest passes (cart included) that may be redeemed on weekdays and weekends without restriction. Senior members are permitted to utilize the guest passes for their own weekend play. This represents a \$356 value for prepaid dues payers.

Social Classification – Members prepaying their dues for October 2023 thru September 2024 will receive one golf guest pass (cart included) and eight additional guest passes redeemable for tennis, pickleball or pool access on weekdays and weekends without restriction. This represents a \$158 value for prepaid dues payers.
